The collision of April Fool's Day and Easter Day inspired all sorts of silly ideas among family and friends. There was the not-quite-appropriate suggestion that the tomb might not be empty this year or the mischievous suggestion to print the Christmas cover on the Easter leaflets. Not a fan of a holiday that requires me to spend the day wondering if someone is going to do something to make me feel foolish, I was pleased when I realized that this year April Fools' Day would fall on Easter because church seems like a good place to be safe from ridicule. Jokes are fine and I am quite capable of laughing at myself; still, it is good to be part of a community that will laugh along with, instead of at, one another.

I am not sure it mattered to me much as a child, but as a young adult the fact that I could count on people at church accepting me was important. Not everyone has that experience, but I did and I am grateful. Church is not a club that you are invited to join only after sufficient vetting and a vote of the board. Church is where the people of God come together. God chooses who belongs, and God chooses everyone and calls them beloved. In this season of Easter we remember just how much God is willing to do for God's people. The trumpets, egg hunts, flowers, and bonnets are only the beginning. From here we walk along with the disciples as they try to figure out what the resurrection means. Not literally, but in our own ways. We did it last year and we will do it next year and we will do it the year after that. What does it mean to you that God loves you that much?

To me it means that while it is nice to be in places where I am safe from ridicule, I am called to not play it safe all the time. I can go beyond testing the water with my toe and allow myself to feel the rush of the current around my ankles and up to my knees. I am not talking about being reckless. I am talking about being willing to reach beyond the comfortable in response to my understanding of what it is to seek, serve, and strive for Jesus.

This Eastertide, I invite you to hold onto the sound of the trumpets or the scent of the lilies or the gentle roughness of a straw bonnet just a little longer than usual. Do not hurry onto the next thing. Let the glory of that day energize you to care in a new and deeper way. It is easy to be busy. It is hard to slow down long enough to wonder and listen and then respond to the needs of the world.

Alleluia, Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed, Alleluia. What next?

As you consider your answer to this question, I invite you to read about all that is happening at St. Peter's in the pages that follow. There are opportunities for worship, fellowship, education, and service. It is all part of building up the body of Christ and sending us forth into the world to love and serve the Lord. Thank you for your part.



Adult Christian Formation in April

Adult Christian Formation returns on **April 8** after the Holy Week recess with a presentation by Dr. Janice Hicks, a clinical pastoral education resident at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania. After 25 years as a chemist and walking with her mother through dementia, she entered Virginia Theological Seminary. From her website: "One in three Episcopalians is over age 65 and another 40% are age 45-64. Congregations will see a large increase in those with dementia and their family members or friends. It is important to prepare congregations to be able to minister to people with dementia and their loved ones, consistent with their being full members of the Body of Christ. Science, theology, and stories can help us understand the physical, emotional, and spiritual aspects of dementia. What do we understand about the stages of the disease and what is happening in the brain? Does dementia impact a person's identity as a person of faith or an atheist or in between? How can we use these insights for better care and better advocacy for people with dementia?"

On **April 22**, Kyle, Sian Myshko, and St. Peter's Youth will present their digital Bible storytelling project on the parable of the prodigal son.

On April 29, Dr. Kiran Sebastian will preach and lead adult formation. Academic dean at Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, he was ordained in the Church of South India, a member of the Anglican Communion, which was formed as part of the largest ecumenical movement in history when the Methodists, Presbyterians, Congregationalists, and Anglicans in colonial India united. His academic specialty is world religion.

OUTREACH FOOD MINISTRY NEWS Weekend Backpacks in Phoenixville

When you think of filled backpacks, books or a much-anticipated camping trip come to mind. For some children, Fridays mean a backpack filled with essential weekend food that staves off hunger. School meals may provide the only consistent nourishment for 14,000 Chester County children. Many experience food insecurity caused by life-changing emergencies such as a parent's job loss or illness. What happens on weekends to these children when they go home?

In Phoenixville, "Phantom Backpacks" provide a steady weekend food supply from October through May. St. John's Lutheran Church program is exemplary. While the Chester County Foodbank Weekend Backpack Food Program serves 10 of 13 school districts, Phoenixville partners with Phoenixville Area Community Services (PACS) and Wegmans for additional fresh fruits and vegetables.

Special thanks to Linda Huggler, Gail Guthridge, Nancy Wilson, and Eileen and Randy Klein, who pack four or five times a year at St. John's Lutheran Church to prepare 54 backpacks for the new Early Learning Center off Pothouse Road in Phoenixville.

Our last packing experience occurs in May. This is a perfect youth activity: action-packed, under an hour, and limited scheduling throughout the school year – ideal for busy teens who want to serve those in need. On Friday night, we checked into our hotel on the East Side. The following morning, we headed to the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine, the fifth largest Christian church in the world. But first, delicious pastries and robust coffee at the renowned Hungarian Pastry Shop across the street from the Cathedral! After our repast, we met with The Rev. Canon Jeanne Person, a long-time friend of Abigail and now Canon Pastor to the Diocese of New York. She kindly offered a private tour of special features of the cathedral, including the famous Christa artwork (a crucifix featuring a woman nailed to a cross), the Great Choir, and several of the side chapels. We then participated in a vertical climb of the cathedral with a cathedral docent, going all the way to the top of the interior roof of the cathedral!

On Saturday evening, we laughed throughout "The Play that Goes Wrong" at the Lyceum Theatre in Times Square. The next morning, after an early trip to Dylan's Candy Shop, we attended the Choral Eucharist at St. Thomas Church, Fifth Avenue. After a nice brunch and some last-minute shopping, we returned by train to Paoli, exhausted but fulfilled.

The youth have two activities planned in April: the second annual Bake-Off on Friday, April 6, from 7:30-9:30PM in the Historic Church, and a trip to the Mutter Museum in Philadelphia (details pending). Children, Youth, and God's Mission Field

"And [Jesus] said to [his disciples], 'Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation.'" (Mark 16:15)



"All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need." (Acts 2:44)

At St. Peter's, we are blessed to have numerous active outreach ministries. And this is appropriate, because in response to worshipping the living God, we know that we must be sent forth into the world to serve the people of God in God's Name. One of my seminary professors—incidentally a professor of Christian mission—constantly reiterated that we as Christians do not have a mission, the Church does not have a mission, but God has a mission. In fact, God is mission. And so we know that our work and service as members of the Body of Christ is indispensable to our identity as Christians, but we are participating in something larger than ourselves and not orchestrated by us.

This summer, there will be two major ways in which our young people will experience intensely God's mission field. June 18-22, we will be hosting Vacation Bible School, the first such bible camp in a while at St. Peter's. Our curriculum is "Abundance Orchard: Where Faith Grows and Hungry People Are Fed." This VBS program is produced by the Society of St. Andrew (endhunger.org), an ecumenical, non-profit, charitable organization based in southwest Virginia that is dedicated to addressing problems of hunger worldwide. The VBS curriculum is available for free online, but the Society of St. Andrew requests that a mission offering be collected at each VBS session. Participants will be encouraged to bring a little money each day that can be directed towards the cause of the Society. The New Testament stories are all about feeding: Jesus having breakfast with his disciples (John 21:1-13), Jesus having lunch with a tax collector (Luke 19:1-10), Jesus having dinner in the home of his friends (Luke 10:38-42), and others. Each day, stories of important mission work will be shared. Activities to raise awareness of issues around food and hunger in the world will also be offered.

One of the most appealing aspects of the Abundance Orchard curriculum is that, unlike most other VBS curricula, it is not fancy. Its purpose is to reflect the conservation and responsible stewardship of resources that its theme promotes. Waste is avoided, along with fancy props that will often be thrown out. This curriculum offers something of theological and biblical substance and connects its topics with real issues in the world. By offering such a program at St. Peter's, we are reflecting the strong commitment in this parish to issues around food in the communities that surround us. We are likewise imparting to this young generation the ever-increasing need to avoid waste while millions go without proper nourishment.

VBS is open to all children from rising kindergarten to rising fifth grade. I invite you to reach out to friends and family who might have interest. Perhaps grandparents will invite your young grandchildren to come and spend this fun week with us. Participants do not need to be members of St. Peter's, and we hope many will not be! Cost is \$20 per child and \$10 for each subsequent child in a family. Register by emailing vbs@stpetersgv.org by May 22.

A week after VBS, seven of our parish youth will be journeying to Beaumont, Texas, to offer hurricane relief to people still reeling from the disastrous effects of Hurricane Harvey. We will be graciously hosted by St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, and that parish will connect us with local residents in need of helping hands. With a mission trip such as this one, youth make direct contact with other people in need. As opposed to simply sending money somewhere in an anonymous fashion, doing hands-on work for people whom you can encounter is all about fostering relationships. This is the essence of the Gospel, where we are called to be connected deeply with one another, meeting people outside of our own circumstances—whatever they may be—and sharing something of ourselves with them, and they with us. I am certain that this mission trip will be a life-changing experience for all of us participating. Please keep our youth in your prayers as they continue to prepare for this endeavor.

At St. Peter's, we are blessed to have an abundance of resources—talent, energy, goodwill, and financial stability—that we can share with others in need. Although our physical campus may be up on a hill in relative peace, the tendrils of our love in the Name of Christ are reaching all over the world, and thanks be to God for that!

The Conversation Project

At one of the Lenten Soup Suppers, we discussed issues related to the end of life. To further the conversation and offer resources, we have invited hospice professional Beth Adams to increase awareness of the need to address individual wishes concerning Advanced Care Directives. She will present materials from The Conversation Project, a national initiative that highlights that it is not enough, nor complete, simply to have Advanced Directives in place. It is equally important to have the conversation about your end-of-life wishes with someone you trust to ensure that these wishes are fulfilled.

The Conversation Project is a practical in-service that guides participants to prepare for these discussions. There is a workbook for each participant that we begin to explore during the presentation and is then completed at home. What are your wishes? Have you addressed them with your physician? Who is the ideal person to carry out your wishes? How do you begin the conversation?
