FROM THE RECTOR ...

Abundant Life through Lent

For a long time, one of those sort-of-inspirational magazine clippings about growing older and wiser was taped inside one of my kitchen cabinets. It was lost in our move and I cannot recall each line of the short poem. What I do remember is that the reader is supposed to understand that a young woman is asking an older woman how she came to be so wise. The older woman says something like, "By making right decisions. "When the young woman asks how she knew which decisions were right, the older one answers, "By making wrong decisions." We do not like to dwell on our mistakes, but the fact of the matter is that if we learn from them they become essential and positive elements in shaping who we are.

I find the Ash Wednesday liturgy to be humbling in a helpful way. Right from the start we acknowledge before God our wretchedness as we pray the collect that opens the service. Later in the Litany of Penitence we recite all the ways in which we have fallen short, made mistakes. It is a uniquely complete recitation of our sins, but, of course, it ends with the words of absolution. God desires life for us. Abundant life made possible by acknowledging our shortcomings and turning toward God.

In the days and weeks to come the natural world will awaken and signs of abundance will begin to appear around us. Most beautifully, the ground will become blanketed by those beautiful yellow flowers that push away the drab grays and browns of late winter. I believe they are weeds technically, but to me there is something breathtaking about them, and they seem to come at just the right time.

Most things have an ebb and flow – the seasons of the earth, the seasons of the church year, and the seasons of life. We move both around and also forward in a pattern that is not quite entirely predictable or regular. To live most fully into who God is calling us to be and the ways in which God is calling us to make a difference, we must be mindful and aware of our actions and their consequences. It sounds like a cliché, but the world is a complicated and difficult place. Grounding ourselves as individuals and as a community in the knowledge of God's love for us and for everyone, truly everyone, is crucial.

The community of St. Peter's Church in the Great Valley is characterized by an openness and acceptance that are very valuable and by a genuine desire to reach out to people in need. We are individuals who come together to worship God and be strengthened for Christian service in the world. We are people who have both made mistakes and had great successes. We are people who care and sometimes need to be cared for. This Lent I invite you to engage in how you have grown, and how you can grow, wiser and into deeper relationship with God, and in how we as a community can do the same. I strongly encourage you to attend our Lenten programs.

Sunday evenings in the barn, we will offer a Lenten "Popcorn Theology" series with the theme of "Communities: Lost and Found." Wednesday evenings in the parish hall, we will offer our Lenten "Soup Supper" program with the theme of "Community Connections, Community Growth." (See page 3 for details about both.) Take this holy season seriously and see how it leads to abundant life.

An Invitation to "Do" Good Works with Us

The mission of Good Works is "to extend the love of Jesus Christ to low-income homeowners by making their homes warmer, safer and drier." As a Good Works partner church for well over ten years, St. Peter's "adopts" a homeowner in the Phoenixville-Spring City area and plans and carries out a home repair plan for twelve to sixteen months. The work typically includes replacing leaky windows and storm doors for warmth and dryness and installing ground fault circuit interrupter outlets in bathrooms and kitchens for safety, but it also addresses needs specific to each home.

We heartily invite new volunteers to join us in good fellowship as we help "eliminate substandard housing in Chester County" and enable our adopted homeowners to experience the love of

Jesus Christ. We are currently working at the Phoenixville home of Elwin, an ailing, elderly widower whose modest accommodations need upgrading for his safety and comfort; over the next few months we expect to replace his bathtub with a walk-in shower; install new bathroom and bedroom flooring after repairing the sub-flooring in both rooms; and complete a number of other "honey-do" tasks like replacing door knobs, repairing cabinet doors and water-damaged ceilings, and sealing and weatherproofing windows and doors.



No special skills are needed – we offer on-the-job training to all comers, and everyone is welcome to join us on the second Saturday of any month. A quick call to volunteer coordinator Mark Carkhuff (610-935-1623) will give you the details about our meeting place and ensure that we have a lunch for you when you come. Do consider joining us in this opportunity to serve our Chester County neighbors!


Notice of St. Peter's Annual Meeting April 30, 2017

According to our by-laws, "The annual meeting of the Corporation and the annual election of vestry persons shall be held in the Church edifice or such adjacent building of the Corporation at the discretion of the Vestry within thirty days after Easter Sunday each year." This year's annual meeting will take place on Sunday morning, **April 30**, following the single 9 A.M. parishwide service.

During the annual meeting, we will hold elections to fill four seats on the vestry. The by-laws stipulate that "all confirmed persons of the age of fourteen years or upwards who shall have been worshipers in this Church as their usual place of worship for at least once a year" are eligible to vote. If you are unsure about your eligibility, contact our parish administrator, Susan House. Please note that you must be present at the annual meeting to vote unless you requested an absentee ballot in advance of the meeting.

A nominating committee assists in the vestry election process. This committee consists of the four outgoing vestry members (Pat Harvey, Joe Herbst, Paige Infortuna, and Steve Ockenden) as well as four atlarge members of the congregation (Jason Hacker, Debi Lynch, Tom Rice, and Dave Tatum), appointed by the vestry in consultation with the rector. If you are interested in serving on the vestry, please speak to any member of the nominating committee. **Any member of the congregation wishing to nominate someone not on the slate designated by the committee may do so by submitting to the committee a petition signed by at least ten eligible voting members no later than March 27**.

Our parish leadership welcomes active participation in discerning God's call for mission and ministry, and motions from the congregation are part of this discernment process. Please note that according to the by-laws "no formal motion may be made at the Annual Meeting involving new business unless such motion is delivered to the Secretary of the Vestry, Mrs. Susy Baum, 30 days prior to the Annual Meeting." Please mark your calendar for this important event in our parish life. There is much good news to celebrate!



Russell Wilson, a St. Peter's parishioner for more than four decades, passed away last month and will be laid to rest at Arlington National Cemetery on Tuesday, April 4. He is survived by **Nancy Cunningham Wilson**, to whom he was married at St. Peter's by the late Rev. Jim Birney; Russell's first wife, Bessie, died in 2000.
